On February 15th, we hosted 'Hook, Fish and Learn' with ACA's Kids Can Catch program and invited the public to join us at Young's Point on Sturgeon Lake. We had a good turnout despite the cold weather forecast and had a pleasant sunny and windless afternoon on the lake. While only a single pike fell victim to our lures, attendees were not discouraged and were keen anglers.

Alberta WPACs teamed up to host the World Water Day; Glacier Preservation webinar on March 21st with guest speakers Daryl Kootenay, Stoney Nakoda Knowledge Keeper, Dr. Masaki Hayashi from the University of Calgary and Mitch Wincentaylo, Headwaters Program Coordinator with Athabasca Watershed Council. School presentations are also going in full swing as Adanna made connections at the Mighty Peace Teachers Convention and it is looking to be a busy spring as teachers book presentations and field trips, even including some in french for the french immersion and francophone schools! Conference - Water Management In Alberta's Boreal

February 25-26, 2025, Mighty Peace Watershed Alliance, Lesser Slave Watershed Council and Athabasca Watershed Council joined forces to present 'Water Management in Alberta's Boreal 2025' conference held in Grande Prairie at the Pomeroy Hotel and Conference Centre. The conference was very successful with 121 registrants attending the two-day event.

We began the first day with some sessions on water quality and data management. We heard from **Mary Kruk** on the use of DataStream for open water quality data, **Bradley Peter** from ALMS on how to use citizen science to improve water monitoring in the boreal, **Lynn Smith and Wynter Flett** from Peavine Metis Settlement about their water program, and **Johanne Little** from the Office of the Chief Scientist on the condition of environment reporting in Alberta. After a fantastic lunch, we moved onto the second session – water quantity and water use. **Craig Melin** from Alberta Energy Regulator spoke about water allocations and drought, while **Chiadih Chang** from AEPA gave a enthusiastic speech about the new AFETUW tool for estimating flows in Alberta. **Petra Rowell** from the Athabasca Watershed Council spoke about water supply in the Athabasca and **Bob Christian** from Forcorp discussed forestry management in relation to watersheds. We ended the session with a chat from **Darryl Smith** from the Alberta Wildlife Federation about the state of artic grayling and walleye and **Landon Driedger** from Mackenzie County on farmer conversations. As attendees enjoyed dinner, our keynote speaker **John Pattison-Williams** gave a thought-provoking talk about the myth of hyperabundance of water in Northern Alberta.

Day 2 started all about boreal ecosystems. **Micheal Merchant** from Alberta Biomonitoring Institute showed off their wetland habitat mapping, **Bin Xu** from NAIT Centre for Boreal Research gave an update on the progress of peatland restoration, **Lelia Tuffner**, Athabasca University gave a interesting chat about the impacts of seismic lines on water. After a networking break, the morning continued with **Scott Ketcheson** from Athabasca University on roads and wetlands in the boreal, **Bruce Nielsen** on the new Alberta Watercourse Crossing Guidebook, and then **Sarah Shortt (AWC)**



and Jess Lario (LSWC) spoke on benthic invertebrates in Northern Alberta. After lunch we heard from Rick Murray from Ducks Unlimited on moving wetland science into practice, Ken Monk from the Northern Fly Fishers on arctic grayling in the Pembina river and finally from our very own Adam Norris on surface water management.





Alberta Merged Wetland Inventory

A State of the Watershed renewal is underway at the Mighty Peace Watershed Alliance, with the Integrated Watershed Management Plan Steering Committee leading this process. The first piece of this work was commissioning The Peace and Slave Watershed: Current and Future Water Use. This report looks at water allocation and use across the watershed as well projections for future use based upon economic factors. New initiatives in the region, such as lithium extraction and nuclear power, require us to be proactive in understanding the needs and effects of these initiatives so that good decision making on how we manage our water and watershed is supported.

Indicators have been selected to inform us about how our watershed is functioning and the indicators have been grouped into 6 categories: Landscape, Biological Community, Surface Water Quality, Surface Water Quantity, Groundwater Quality and Groundwater Quantity. One indicator is Wetland extent and so we have accessed the most recent data for this and are examining the state of wetland extent and what that tells us about our watershed and how it functions.

Preparations and site visits are underway to get ready for the field season and the work to be done with our projects. Two new projects, Peace River Small Tributaries project and Resiliency in the Wapiti

Watershed project are collaborations with some great partners -AgroForestry Woodlot Extension Society, Alberta Conservation Association, Northern Sunrise County, County of Grande Prairie, Cows and Fish, Mackenzie County and landowners to implement management practices that support watershed function. We would like to thank AEPA Watershed Resiliency and Restoration Program and Canada Water Agency for funding these projects.

LakeKeepers lake monitoring

The Mighty Peace Watershed Alliance (MPWA) once again partnered with the Alberta Lake Management Society (ALMS) to conduct winter sampling as part of the 2025 LakeKeepers Program. This winter presented some early challenges, with unseasonably warm temperatures in January making it difficult to access the deepest parts of the lakes. Fluctuating freeze-thaw cycles led to ice heaves and pooling water on the surface, complicating field conditions. Fortunately, February and March brought more stable conditions, with thicker, clearer ice that allowed for more reliable sampling—though it remained an unusual season overall.

With the support of dedicated volunteers, MPWA sampled three lakes within the watershed this winter: Sturgeon, Snipe, and Swan Lakes. All data collected through the LakeKeepers Program is publicly available via the openaccess platform <u>DataStream</u>. In addition, ALMS produces an annual summary report of lakes sampled across both winter and summer seasons, offering a valuable visual comparison of lake health across Alberta.

Looking ahead, MPWA is eager to take part in the 2025 Summer LakeKeepers Program—and we're inviting you to get involved! We're seeking volunteers interested in learning how to monitor and sample local lakes. Access to a boat, kayak, canoe, or other watercraft is essential to reach the deepest points of each lake.

Join us in protecting and understanding our watershed one sample at a time!
